As a Judge, he was hugely respected by pullers and coaches alike, for being firm but fair.


In his TWIF role, he had total respect around the world for his views, judgement and calm analysis of a situation. His opinion was often sought in challenging situations.



Many a heated argument was defused with logic and a quiet and sound reasoning and we normally ended up with a compromise and middle ground and a better outcome from what we started off with.

Sue and family, we pray that you will find peace and comfort in the knowledge that he touched many lives globally.

And that he will be remembered with fondness and respect as a true Tug of War person who will leave a gap in many lives.

We also had lots of fun over the years. I remember with fondness the "gay twins" in Italy – this is a long story which I will keep for another day and the time when he and Cathal McKeever was named "Mr Shovel and Mr Spade" given them testing the expected pulling conditions of competition arenas intended for TWIF championships. Maybe those 'trophies' are still somewhere and are testament to their wisdom and insight of the ethos and spirit of our sport.
